Pupil Premium Grant 13-14

As part of the Coalition Government's policy to improve the educational attainment of under-performing pupils, additional funding has been allocated to schools through the Pupil Premium Grant (PPG).

This allocation (£900 per qualifying pupil) is based on the number of pupils in Reception to Year 6, who have been entitled to Free School Meals (FSM), as recorded on the termly census.

An additional allocation (£250) is made for pupils of service personnel and Looked After Children (LAC) who comply with the looked after children criteria, also receive an allocation of £900.

Reception 7 children are entitled to the Pupil Premium Grant and receive extra support in Reading, Writing and Maths.

- Year 1 8children are entitled to the Pupil Premium Grant and receive extra support in Reading, Writing and Maths.
- Year 2 3 children are entitled to the Pupil Premium Grant and receive extra support in Reading, Writing and Maths.
- Year 3 12 children are entitled to the Pupil Premium Grant and receive extra support in Reading, Writing and Maths.
- Year 4 9 children are entitled to the Pupil Premium Grant and receive extra support in Reading, Writing and Maths.
- Year 5 6 children are entitled to the Pupil Premium Grant and receive extra support in Reading, Writing and Maths.
- Year 6 8 children are entitled to the Pupil Premium Grant and receive extra support in Reading, Writing and Maths.

What is the impact of the above spending on our Pupil Premium children? 2013-14

Below we have outlined how our Pupil Premium children have performed in the end of Key-Stage 2 and Key stage 2 SATS tests for reading, writing and maths.

In 'Table 1' we have shown how they performed compared to other Pupil Premium children nationally. In 'Table 2' we have shown how our Pupil Premium children performed compared to our non-pupil premium children. I have also shown the national scores for all children. These show how our pupil premium children performed compared to all children in the country.

At the end of Key-Stage 2 (Year 6) children should achieve a score of 28 points. This is a 4B National Curriculum Level which is a typical level expected of a 11 year old child.

We can see from this table that our PPC children scored higher than the average for PPC children nationally. The only gap was in the reading, this is now a high priority for school improvement in 2014-5 plan . There is no gap in attainment between non pupil premium and pupil premium children .

We can see from this table that our PPC children scored higher than the average for PPC children nationally. There is no gap in attainment between non pupil premium and pupil premium children .
